

Financial Aid


We strongly believe that a Brown education should be accessible to all regardless of their economic background. Brown has a need-blind admission policy for all U.S. citizens and permanent residents.

Need-blind admission simply means that a student's ability to pay for a Brown education will not be a factor in the admission decision. Its basic premise is that a family's financial circumstances will not be considered when reviewing a student's application for undergraduate admission. This policy has allowed us to further open our doors to students who had previously thought an Ivy League education was out of reach. Brown is committed to maintaining a student body that is strong in intellect, diverse in character and driven to achieve. Any student who possesses these qualities should have the opportunity to study at Brown. The need-blind policy further underscores this commitment.

Applying to BROWN

Note to Counselors

- Early Decision: We are a single-choice Early Decision binding program. A student admitted Early Decision to Brown is committed to attend and must withdraw all Regular Decision applications, and any applications to non-binding Early programs. We make the majority of our admission offers during Regular Decision, with Early Decision acceptances representing slightly more than one quarter of the first-year admission offers we make each year.
- 2. Video Portfolio: The video portfolio provides students an opportunity to tell us more about themselves, in their voice, beyond the information they provide in the application. Sharing a two-minute personal video is a helpful way for students to show us who they are and why they are interested in attending Brown. Early Decision deadline is November 6 and Regular Decision deadline is January 8.
- Alumni Interview: We are suspending the alumni interviewing program for the 2020-21 admission cycle, but we will be offering opportunities for students to hear from alumni about their Brown journeys through virtual panels and webinars.
- 4. Course Selection is an individual process, and we cannot advise on a student's specific schedule. However, we encourage students to take the most challenging curriculum available to them in the five major subject areas. Students should challenge themselves academically and we are fully aware that every context and every curriculum is different.
- Counselor Reports: In the interest of your time and ours, we strongly recommend that you limit your letter of recommendation to one page. We would be grateful if you passed this advice to the teachers as well.
- 6. Fee Waiver: As part of our commitment to make a Brown University education accessible to students from all income backgrounds, Brown is making automatic application fee waivers available to more students. Brown will automatically waive the application fee for any student who is enrolled in or eligible for the Federal Free or Reduced Price Lunch program (FRPL), as well as students who are enrolled in federal, state or local programs that aid students from low-income families (e.g., TRIO Programs). Additionally, Brown will automatically waive the application fee for any student who belongs to a community-based organization or college access organization that promotes educational opportunity for low-income students. Brown will continue to honor fee-waiver request forms from the College Board, NACAC and school counselors.

Program in Liberal Medical Education: eight-year program

The program is five years in length. Students may receive a bachelor of arts (A.B.) degree from Brown and a bachelor of fine arts (BFA) degree from RISD. (CEEB Code 3094; ACT Code 3800)

As COVID-19 continues to impact students and families around the world, it became clear that adjustments needed to be made to our policy regarding standardized testing this year.

While we cannot change the realities of these unprecedented circumstances, we can change our admission policy to address the challenges with which we are confronted. For first-year applicants in the 2020-21 admission cycle, Brown is now test-optional.
